# What is ILDA?



The International
Lutheran Deaf
Association (ILDA)
commenced its ministry
during the first biennial
convention in Chicago in

1971. The purpose, according to the revised constitution (2017) is "to coordinate and strengthen the religious activities and services in our congregations, helping promote their growth to the highest possible level in service to their Lord and Savior, and to promote the Christian faith and life of Lutheran deaf people, all deaf people, and others with whom we associate, and to carry on our ministry throughout the world."

ILDA shall communicate and convey to the deaf members, the programs, plans and goals of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS). It shall support layleadership among deaf Lutherans in all areas of faith and life.

In 1975, the members voted on the ratification of the revised constitution. The historic document helped develop the ILDA image and facilitated the operation and administration of the association. The members also supported the goal of recruiting as many lay people as possible and getting them actively involved in ILDA affairs.

In 1987, the aim of ILDA was to carry out the objectives of serving the Lord in His church and to obtain the financial support that would lead to self-sufficiency. It was hoped that many programs and projects for the ministry and mission of ILDA will become a reality.

Membership in ILDA is open to deaf or hearing people. There are three levels of membership: Active, Associate and Supporting. To read a description of each membership go to www.deafjesus.org and look for the ILDA membership form. Membership dues cost \$30 for two years and the membership expires on September 30 of even-numbered years.

ILDA relies on its official publication, *The Deaf Lutheran*, to convey information of its activities and services to deaf Lutherans. It is printed four times a year. Subscriptions cost \$10 a year.

During its 50 years of the ministry to the Deaf, ILDA boldly faced the challenge and became a completely self-supporting organization in the LCMS and continues its mission of outreach programs wherever such opportunities exist.

In 1995 ILDA celebrated its 25th anniversary together with the 100th anniversary of LCMS Deaf Ministry. It was held in Schaumburg, Illinois. The 50th Anniversary of ILDA and the 125th Anniversary of the LCMS Deaf Ministry was held July 2021, in Elk Grove Village, a suburb of Chicago, Illinois.

# **How ILDA Became A Reality**

The earliest record of suggested gatherings of LCMS Deaf was in the late 1930s. Regional conferences were held beginning in 1949. In 1960 Pastor Theodore Frederking proposed to Ephphatha Conference a national gathering of LCMS Deaf. The following year Frederking, together with Pastors Wayne Bottlinger and August Hauptman, was delegated to serve on a committee which was to study the proposal, provide cost estimates and suggest ways and means of meeting the cost. In 1962 they presented their study and proposals to Ephphatha Conference.

Again, nothing came of the study until several years later. In 1965, the LCMS convention passed resolutions adopting the Mission Affirmations and merging the several boards for Missions into a single board. Following these actions (which terminated the old Board for Missions to the Deaf, January 1966) the church's Ministry to the Deaf came under special review with the proposal that the North American Districts of Synod become responsible for the administration and subsidy of local deaf congregations.

The 1967 Synod Convention in New York City (Memorial 1-09) designated the Regional advisors as an Ad Hoc Committee to study the matter of administration. Part of the materials produced by the Ad Hoc Committee contained seventeen (17) basic concerns in Ministry to the Deaf. One of the concerns stated was that the deaf congregations remain united. If the North American Districts are to administer the work, the national unity of this ministry would be threatened. "Thus, at the November 1-2, 1968,

meeting of the Board for Missions, the Secretary for the Ministry to the Deaf, Rev. Herbert Rohe, proposed several measures resulting from the Ad Hoc Committee study, namely: 1) that the Board for Missions continue to sponsor the Ephphatha Conference as an official pastoral conference (thus assuring and perpetuating unity among the workers in this Ministry); 2) that as a means of developing lay-leadership in the work among the deaf, the Board for Missions establish an International Lutheran Deaf Association (thus maintaining and assuring a national unity, visibility, and self-determination among deaf congregations, see Attachment #1, minutes of the Board for Missions meeting, November 1-2, 1968, Page 17 item 252(c) "development of Lay Leadership in the work among the deaf"), and 3) that the Synod in 1969 observe the 75th Anniversary of the work among the deaf.

Early in 1969 the action of the Board for Missions was announced in *The Deaf Lutheran*. Pastor Rohe also reported this to the Regional Conferences and EC in his report, "WHAT'S NEW FOR THE DEAF IN THE 70'S? April 15, 1969". These measures also came before the Denver Convention in 1969.

When Resolution 1-18 was defeated, the resolution regarding ILDA did not come for a vote. However in the following months, the Board for Missions steadfastly helped to the establishment of ILDA. The Constitution of ILDA was drawn up and proposed to the Ad Hoc Committee, to the Board for Missions (September 15, 19690 and EC. The Board for Missions revived the Seventeen Concerns to the

Ad Hoc Committee and again proposed the establishment of the International Lutheran Deaf Association. All regions were urged to study the Constitution of ILDA.

In the fall of 1969 the Regional advisors met to study it. In December of 1969, the Board for Missions staff again approved for the Board for Missions the policy statement regarding district administration, guidelines for Ministry to the Deaf, and regions and Regional Advisors. In 1970 the proposed Constitution (dated April 29, 1970) was sent to all congregation. On June 22 and 23, 1970, the Regional Advisors met with lay representatives from each region at Concordia College, Milwaukee, WI, (prior to EC) for a planning meeting. Plans were laid for a constituting convention in Chicago, Illinois on July 16-18, 1971.

Two days were spent revising the proposed Constitution for ILDA. Each region was given specific assignments in preparation for the Constituting convention the next year, and pro-tem officers were elected for ILDA as follows:



#### 125 years of Deaf Ministry in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod

ILDA would not be able to celebrate 50 years of Deaf Ministry and 125 years of Deaf Ministry in the LCMS if it not were for a letter written by a deaf man named Edward J. Pahl back in 1894. Pahl was from the Lutheran Deaf School and he wrote a letter requesting services for the deaf in Chicago. This letter was forwarded to Rev. Augustus Reinke of Bethlehem Lutheran Church. On March 4, 1894, Rev. Reinke preached the first Lutheran service for the deaf in sign language. His text was "God is Love." Attendance at the service was 16 people. This is how Deaf Ministry under the LCMS started 125 years ago and ILDA was organized 50 years ago.

Praise the Lord for the opportunity of celebrating the anniversaries together in the nearby suburbs of Chicago. The first ILDA convention was held July 16-18, 1971, at the Hyatt Regency House in Chicago, the 25th Anniversary was held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel-Woodfield in Schaumburg, and the 50th Anniversary was held July 22-25, 2021, at the Holiday Inn in Elk Grove Village. It is so fitting to be celebrating all these milestones in the Chicago area.

Below is a photo from 1894 that shows the first organized group of deaf Lutherans in the LCMS. The photo was taken in Lincoln Park, Michigan. The photo includes Edward J. Pahl (front row, second from the right).



# The Beginning of ILDA

(A memoir by Clarence Schultz, as printed in the 25th Anniversary Book, July 1995)

During the year of 1968, Rev. William Ludwig had been searching for available men to represent the Great Lakes Region of the Deaf and attending the meeting in preparation of forming

ILDA. After narrowing it down to two men, he chose me to represent at the first meeting in Milwaukee on the weekend of June 22, 1970. I was certainly pleased to be honored to do so. Seven representatives and advisors including one from Canada were at the meeting.

We studied the proposed constitution and offered suggestions for revision. The constitution was prepared with the help of C.O.S.D. in cooperation with the LCMS Mission Board. The pastoral advisors deserve appreciation for their part in encouraging and starting the foundation of the International Lutheran Deaf Association. Without them, I doubt that the meeting could go smooth. In this meeting temporary officers to conduct the constituting convention were chosen. I was the chairman.

We decided after long and careful consideration to select for the ILDA convention July 16-18, 1971, to be held in Chicago, Illinois. Chicago, as you know, is always an ideal location for conventions, especially the first one for ILDA. In coincidence, we were to observe the commemoration of the 75th Anniversary of

our ministry to the deaf.

Again in the fall of 1970, we were called to Chicago for another constitution. After the meeting on Sunday I was on the committee to tour a suitable hotel for the ILDA convention. However, the site was undecided and left in the hands of Rev. Jones, who being the pastor for the deaf in Chicago, had time to search and locate the right site.

The two meetings in Milwaukee and Chicago were no play and good times. We had some difficult questions and some proposed parts of the constitution were weighed carefully. Of course, we did not expect the perfect results of the meetings, but we tried as best as possible to the satisfaction to all of the deaf, even every one of you here. Excuse my off-beam, some of you may have read the history of how the constitution of America was prepared the hard way, and the delegates, properly chosen, stayed and worked hard in Philadelphia for more than thirty days. As a result the constitution was and is acclaimed the best possible. So you must understand that to study and propose the constitution for the International Lutheran Deaf Association was no easy matter.

Finally, the convention of ILDA held on July 16-18, 1971, was a reality and a success. You have read the results in *The Deaf Lutheran* and good pictures were appreciably shown. I need not go any further in details. Some of you were there to observe the first convention. It was a long-awaited fulfillment of a dream. That is why I must be here to keep you fully informed and

help build a stronger link of the Great Lakes Region and ILDA.

Now the first convention in Chicago went down in history as the milestone for the deaf achievement. You are the voice. You have the rights and demands for recognition which is the legally formed organization International Lutheran Deaf Association.

Although the first part of the constitution was approved and adopted, the latter parts have not been approved or changed because of insufficient time and now left in the hands of the Board of Directors. Please take my advice that if you want any suggestion to change or add to the constitution, give them to Evelyn DeMeyere, an official vice-president on the Board of Directors. She would submit directly the results of any action from the Great Lakes Region to ILDA.

In conclusion it is my feeling that to keep the International Lutheran Association well functioning within the constitution for steady growth, we need to rely on the pastoral advisors and participants and of course, the experienced deaf leaders who have their knowledge or abilities in their specified fields of the deaf such as National Association of the Deaf or state or local organizations. I hope, hence forth the ILDA is and will be recognized as the growing strength of the Deaf Lutherans in America.

I'd like to repeat, as I said in Chicago as the acting chairman in my message of introduction, that the International Lutheran Deaf Association is our organization of the Deaf Lutherans, by Deaf Lutherans, and for Deaf Lutherans.

The future of the International Lutheran Deaf Association depends on every one of you. May God through our Lord Jesus Christ help us!

# The Life of Uriel C. Jones



Uriel C. Jones of Knoxville, TN, was hired as editor and subscription manager of the *Deaf Lutheran* by Synod's Board for Missions on January 1, 1972. He came to St. Louis with an excellent background in printing and editing and was well qualified to serve as an editor.

A graduate of Gallaudet College in 1924, he earned his Master's degree in 1943 from the University of Tennessee. His professional career centered in teaching deaf young people. He was a classroom teacher and printing instructor at the

Idaho School for the Deaf (1924-1928); a classroom teacher and printing instructor at the Mississippi School for the Deaf (1928-1936) where he edited the DEAF MISSISSIPPIAN; and an editor of the TENNESSEE OBSERVER (1936-1971) at the Tennessee School for the Deaf, Knoxville, TN, where he was a printing instructor for 10 years and the vocational principal for 25 years.

His editing experience also included the vocational bulletin of the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf (1939-1947), a Rotarian Club publication (1960-1966) and numerous school yearbooks. During World War II, he worked for the Knoxville, TN, *Journal* as an editorial assistant.

Jones was well known on the national scene for his outspoken support of the potential of the deaf to succeed in all walks of life if given the education and the opportunity, and he contributed articles on various subjects to many national publications, including the American Annuals of the Deaf and the Silent Worker. Well read and widely traveled, he has often been called upon to speak at conventions and banquets across the country.

Although retired from active teaching, Jones held membership in the following organizations: Gallaudet College Alumni Association, the National Association of the Deaf, the Convention of American Instructors of the Deaf, the National Fraternal Society for the Deaf, and the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf.

Jones was married June 29, 1930, to Evelyn McMullen, whom the Lord took home on February 27, 1971. They were blessed with a son, Uriel Jr. of Greensboro, NC and a daughter, Barbara, married to a Lutheran pastor in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

On Thursday morning, February 10, 1977, Jones went home with the Lord. His daughter, Barbara Ulrich, discovered that he died in his sleep. He was 74 years old.

# **ILDA Logo and Banner**

In the November 1970 issue of *The Deaf Lutheran*, a contest was announced for the purpose of designing an ILDA emblem (logo). First place prize was a \$50 Church Extension Fund bond. The winner of the contest was Archie Marshall from St. Louis, MO. The host committee of the 1981 convention used his design and made a banner. Ferol Hauptman (Rev. August Hauptman's wife) and Marion Anderson volunteered to make the ILDA banner. Two months prior to the convention it was completed. This banner was displayed on stage at each biennial convention from 1981 until 2003 when it was replaced with a new banner. The 2003 Minneapolis convention was the first time the ILDA members were seeing the new banner. It was made by Winona Alter and the Indianapolis committee. The old banner was retired to Concordia Historical Institute, St. Louis, MO.

#### The Artist Interprets His Design

(reprinted from *The Deaf Lutheran*, September 1971 issue)

The design (see the next page) consists of a stylized dove, a ribbon streaming from its beak, in a downward path within a circle. The dove is the symbol of the Holy Spirit descending from above. The Holy Spirit is the source of all faith, inspiration, knowledge, and action.

We first notice the head of the dove with its wide-awake eye. This shows we are eagerly aware of ILDA's purposes. We see that the wings of the dove form the letters *I L D A*. The body is the ear, symbolizing the deaf. The tail feathers embody an artistic letter L for Lutheran. The four feathers in the tail are the four corners of the earth representing ILDA's world-wide scope. The world itself is the circle in which the name of our organization appears. The ribbon carried by the dove has on its words showing how the Spirit will bless the deaf in ILDA: *Faith, Leadership, Fellowship, and Service.* 

All in all, the emblem conveys the message that with the Spirit's help the International Lutheran Deaf Association reaches out to do God's work among the deaf throughout the world.

# God's 1000 Club

God's 1000 Club was established by the ILDA Board of Directors. The name "God's 1000 Club" was chosen because, first of all, the work of ILDA is to get the Good News of God's Son to the deaf everywhere. 1,000 represented the number of donors or club members, that were hoped to enlist.

People who became members in God's 1,000 Club were asked to contribute \$10.00 each year thereafter. This was not a part of the regular ILDA dues and it did not pay for a subscription to *The Deaf Lutheran*. Any donations given to God's 1,000 Club were only to be used to help pay the expenses of ILDA Board meetings.

# **Lutheran Deaf Mission Society (LDMS)**

The story of LCMS Deaf missions begins in the period following the American Civil War. Lutheran congregations involved in the efforts to provide homes for children left fatherless by the war established the Lutheran Children's Friend Society. In 1873, Rev. J. A. Huegli led the efforts of Christians in the Detroit area to establish an LCFS orphanage. The board called as the orphanage's first director Rev. George Speckhard, who was serving a Michigan Lutheran parish further north. Rev. Speckhard, himself an orphan, was well suited for the post, but with him came a little surprise.

Prior to becoming a pastor, Rev. Speckhard had been a teacher for the Deaf in Germany. When he was later serving as a parish pastor in Michigan, he discovered two Deaf girls, daughters of Lutheran parents. So he added to his pastoral duties the tutoring of these two girls.


When Rev. Speckhard received the call to become the director of the Detroit orphanage, both he and the parents of the Deaf children were concerned about the girls' education. They asked the board of the orphanage to allow these two Deaf girls to reside at the orphanage so they could continue their schooling. The board agreed, and soon word spread to other families of Deaf children.

Within one year the board realized they had an unexpected opportunity for ministry. After weighing their options, they decided to reorganize the orphanage as the Lutheran Institute for the Deaf, and to transfer the orphans who were first resident there to a sister facility near Chicago.

Twenty years after the founding of the Deaf school in Detroit, one of its graduates, **Edward Pahl**, enlisted the help of the school's director, **Daniel H. Uhlig**, to address the spiritual needs of Deaf adults. Director Uhlig alerted **Rev. Augustus Reinke** of (First)

Bethlehem Lutheran Church of Chicago, who, in turn, met with Mr. Pahl. By their combined efforts, Reinke and Pahl started congregational ministry for Deaf

people on Sunday March 4, 1894. Within two years, Rev. Reinke also ministered regularly to Deaf people in Milwaukee, St. Louis, Louisville, and many other cities.



The 1896 convention of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in Fort Wayne, Indiana, had the opportunity to witness the fruit of Rev. Reinke's ministry, as he led worship in Sign Language, assisted by Deaf members of the congregation. During that convention, Synod adopted Deaf Missions as an official mission program of Synod. Pastor Reinke was elected chairman of the new board, and within six months four other men were called to work full-time with Deaf people.

The Deaf mission program was administered by a separate board from 1896 until 1965. During that time also it was responsible for Blind Ministry until it had its own board in 1949. In 1965 Deaf Missions became part of the unified Board of Missions.

Deaf congregations met in 1950 to draw up plans for a Deaf Mission Society which helped with the beginning of work with Deaf persons in the Orient.

In 1959, **Rev. William Ludwig** became the first Deaf Lutheran to graduate from the seminary and receive ordination into the pastoral ministry. Since then, many other Deaf people have followed his lead, as they have given themselves to the Gospel ministry as pastors, teachers, parish assistants, and overseas missionaries.

In 1971, Deaf people established the International

**Lutheran Deaf Association (ILDA)** for the purpose of "Sharing the Good News with Deaf People through fellowship and leadership training." The Deaf Mission Society and *The Deaf Lutheran* monthly magazine became a part of that organization. The ILDA raises about \$25,000 every two years for mission projects over and above regular congregational missions.

The 1973 LCMS convention voted to transfer administration of Deaf missions to the Districts of Synod, while the LCMS mission office continued to provide advisory support and train new workers. Most Districts embraced the Deaf congregations they inherited. Even though the LCMS Mission Board no longer had direct oversight of Deaf congregations and ministries, the LCMS Office for Deaf Mission served as the glue that held together the network of Deaf ministries scattered among the Districts.

In 1994, the LCMS had 63 Deaf congregations in 25 states served by 30 full-time pastors or missionaries, plus three pastors in part-time Deaf ministry. About 200 "hearing" congregations had regular interpreted ministry for Deaf persons; less than a half-dozen of the pastors of those hearing churches were able to use Sign Language. Profoundly Deaf communicant members in the LCMS numbered about 8,000.

A major change occurred in 2008 when Synod staff organized the **Lutheran Deaf Mission Society (LDMS)** an independent Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS. The Mission Board then transferred its Deaf mission programs to the LDMS, which continues Synod's work of providing resources support for Districts, congregations, and Synod's international mission partners. LDMS also works to recruit and train church workers for Deaf ministry.

Today we have significantly fewer Deaf congregations where American Sign Language is the primary means of communication. One factor that has led to this decline is a reduction of District support for Deaf missions. Today we have 29 Deaf congregations, only seven of which receive any support from their District. We are thankful for many hearing congregations which now offer interpreted worship

and Bible study.

Lutheran Deaf schools exist in Brazil (2), Hong Kong (1), India (4), and Macau (1). In addition, Deaf adult missions are active in Ghana, Kenya, Hong Kong, India, as well as Australia, Norway.







Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN, offers courses which expose students to the church's need for Deaf missions and various models for meeting those needs. The seminary also supports hearing churches with interpreted ministries through its summer Church Interpreter Training Institute.

Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, MO, prepares Deaf students for professional church work as pastors and deaconesses through its online Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology.

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has enjoyed a long and fruitful ministry among Deaf people, sharing the Good News of God's love and forgiveness in Jesus Christ with those whose primary mode of communication is Sign Language.

#### LDMS PROGRAMS

The Lutheran Deaf Mission Society seeks to continue work previously done by the LCMS mission

staff. Chief among those tasks is to provide networking, resources, and moral support to LCMS Deaf congregations, workers in Deaf ministry, and hearing congregations serving the Deaf community. We stay connected through Facebook, our Deaf ministry email group, and **Ephphatha Conference** (EC). Rev. Daryl Gehlbach, who is our EC Director, also serves as our Archivist. He is our expert for all things relating to LCMS Deaf ministry history. (If you ever find historical photos and articles relating to your church's Deaf ministry, please contact us so we can help preserve and share this important records.)



Another vital goal of LDMS is equipping Deaf church members as ministry leaders in their home congregations and their local communities. Dr. Rodney Rynearson and Rev. John Reinke enlisted several pastors and lay leaders to write and record video lessons for the **Deaf Pah!** training program. These lessons are now free to the public online through deafjesus.org/deafpah. We are still adding new courses to the Deaf Pah! program.





A third important mission of LDMS recruiting and training the next generation of LCMS church workers in Deaf ministry. Our **Deaf Institute of Theology (DIT)** program partners with ILDA and Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, MO, in providing training and support for Deaf students preparing for professional service as pastors and deaconesses.

LDMS also seeks to help hearing congregations serve the Deaf community through our **Interpreted**Ministry Support. LDMS partners with ILDA in offering an Interpreted Ministry Conference for church interpreters concurrent with ILDA's biennial convention.

Also supporting hearing churches striving to do Deaf ministry, we offer **DeafLITES** (Lutherans Inspiring, Teaching, Equipping, Serving), a weekend orientation and training program pioneered by Rev. John Reinke.

LDMS also serves as a channel for support to overseas **World Mission** partners engaged in Deaf ministry. God has made it possible for us to assist Deaf work in India and Kenya, Africa.

The LDMS **Technology** staff manages the internet systems which makes our work possible – the LDMS website (deafjesus.org), YouTube, Facebook, email, and online file-sharing.

#### LDMS – ILDA PARTNERSHIP

The Lutheran Deaf Mission Society serves LCMS congregations and church workers engaged in Deaf ministry. The International Lutheran Deaf Association is the fellowship of LCMS Deaf Lutherans. You will find many of the same people in both organizations, as we serve and support one another, sharing common goals, and a united mission. We work together to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to Deaf people who do not yet know Him. We join hands in encouraging one another to grow in our faith, love, and service to Him.





The purpose of the Junior ILDA is to get young people involved both in the goals and fellowship of ILDA. These young people are the future of ILDA. While we can provide guidance, we hope that the youth will contribute their own ideas and dreams and grow on that.

Since the inception of Junior ILDA at its first convention in Portland, Oregon, many adults still question the issue of the age range for Junior ILDA. The age range of 13-21 seems to be inappropriate, because the voting age for these people during state primaries or the general elections is 18. Should Junior ILDA consider changing the age range? We hope Junior ILDA will report to the ILDA Board of Directors giving their age recommendations to include in the ILDA Handbook. As of this writing, there are no guidelines on Junior ILDA, which the new Law Committee Chairman will need to develop. When he or she selects their ILDA Law Committee, should consider picking a Junior ILDA representative to plan writing their guidelines for the ILDA Handbook.





#### History of *The Deaf Lutheran*

(Author unknown—as printed in the ILDA 25th Anniversary Book with revisions)

The initial request of the deaf to publish their own periodical came as early as 1902. The Board, in concurrence with the Synodical Convention, however, felt that the time was not yet ripe for a separate publication. Instead *The Lutheran Pioneer* was used for dissemination of information. A separate publication was urged because the deaf were unable to read German *Der Lutheraner*.

From 1902 until 1908 the Pioneer, as of course, Der Lutheraner, as well as Die Missions-Taube and the Lutheran Witness kept the special interests of the deaf in mind.

A farewell editorial in the Lutheran Pioneer states:

The number will likely be the last issue of this extra edition of the Lutheran Pioneer with "among the Deaf" appended, since it is proposed from January the first next to publish a new paper under the name of *Deaf* Lutheran for the direct benefit of our deaf throughout our various missions. Such a paper has became a necessity for various reasons, and we hope that all who have hitherio subscribed to this extra edition of Pioneer would not become subscribers to the *Deaf Luthera*n . The new publication was, however, in no way to crowd out the *Pioneer* in its original form, but we hope that, since both follow different lines, readers of the one will be and remain readers also of the other.

In January 1909, *The Deaf Luthera*n made its appearance, edited from 1711 Meinecke Ave. As you might surprise,

T. Wangerin served as the first editor, the publication was launched as a four-page monthly, 10 1/2 x 7 1/2 inches, and remained in that form until the revisions in January 1954.

Already in the first editorial, Editor Wangerin announced the purposes of the public cation. We regret that Volume 1 was not available for this study, since it is not filed at Concordia Historical Institute. We quote from the Dams series: In the name of God we launch on the sea of enterprise a new periodical which was to be published monthly in the interests of the deaf of our various missions and is known as The Deaf Lutheran. It contains articles for the spiritual and moral betterment of its readers as well as news items. from the various Lutheran deaf circles, thus keeping its readers in touch and sympathy with each other. It proposed to clear away misunderstandings and wrong notions as to Lutheranism. It will show what true Lutheranism stands for, what it believes, teaches and confesses in word and deed. It is to be a Christian Herald, a Lutheran instructor with the object of enlarging and improving the religious and spiritual knowledge of its readers.

Initially the magazine cost only 25 cents per year; January 21 it was raised to 35 cents and in 1923 to 50 cents per year.

During the depression price reduced to 25 cents per year (July 1933) and in December 1950 restored to 50 cents. Another increase occurred in January 1959 to \$1.00 per year. In 1967

to \$2.00. In 1969, under blanket plan, \$1.00 per year. In 1970 to \$2.00. In 1971 it was raised to \$3.00 per year. In September 1980, it was raised to \$3.50 per year. In October 1982 it was raised to \$5.00 per year for individual, under blanket plan, \$3.50 per year.

Another increase occurred in January 1959 to \$1.00 per year. In 1967 to \$2.00. In 1969, under blanket plan, \$1.00 per year. In 1970 to \$2.00. In 1971 it was raised to \$3.00 per year. In September 1980, it was raised to \$3.50 per year. In October 1982 it was raised to \$5.00 per year for individual, under blanket plan, \$3.50 per year.

In November 1983 the price reduced to \$4.00 for individual and for the blanket plan was the same \$3.50 per year. In September 1987 it raised to \$4.50 for the blanket plan and \$5.00 for individual per year. The publication now launches an eight-page bi-monthly, 8 1/2 x 11 inches and remains in that form as its present format. In September 1991, it was raised to \$5.50 for the blanket plan and \$6.00 for individual fee per year.

2021 UPDATE: In January 2009, the cost increased to \$15.00 per year. In January 2014, the cost went down to \$10.00 per year. The Deaf Lutheran suspended publication from the Fall of 2009 to 2012. The current cost of a subscription is now \$10.00 per year. The Deaf Lutheran newsletter can also be view online at www.deafjesus.org/ilda/DeafLutheran.

## **ILDA MINUTES**



### **ILDA 1971 Convention Minutes**

The first International **Lutheran Deaf Association** (ILDA) Convention opening service was held on Friday, July 16, 1971, at 8:30 p.m., United Room, Regency Hyatt House in Chicago Illinois. Rev. Russel Johnson of Detroit, Michigan led the opening worship service which included the commission of Whilhelm R. Wegner of Delavan, Wisconsin, and Robert Oettel of Chicago, Illinois as the Lay Ministers to the Deaf. The opening and closing hymns were given by Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere and Mrs. Genevieve Klein. The Scripture lessons, Mark 7:31-37 ad Acts 16:105, were read by the Lay Ministers to the Deaf. The commissioning officials were Rev. William Bartling of Franklin Park, Illinois, and Rev. Martin Kosche of Delavan, Wisconsin. After the special service we had an informal fellowship.

The first bi-annual meeting of ILDA Convention session was held on Saturday, July 17, 1971, at 8:30 AM at the Rosemont Ballroom, Regency Hyatt House in Chicago.

The opening devotion was given by Rev. Myron Prok. His topic was "Has it happened to You," based on the Gospel of Matthew. The Ohio group choir sang a song, "Oh, For a Thousand Tongues."

Pro-tem President Clarence Schultz opened the meeting session with the comments and thanked to all the pastors and others for the help of getting the ILDA organized, and explained how the ILDA started.

The president introduced the keynote speaker, Rev.
William Kohn, the chairman of Divisions of Missions, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and he challenged us to proclaim the Gospel, to share in the work of the church, to communicate Christ's love and forgiveness. The president thanked Rev. Kohn for the speech.

The business meeting opened with the revision of the 1971 ILDA Constitution. The President introduced the pro-tem officers: Vice President Ted Brighton; Secretary Robert Baker; Treasurer Warren Riege;

Chairman of Nominations
Gary Schlub; Chairman of
Displays Billy Fitzgerald; and
the Parliamentarian Marion
Van Manen. The President
explained about the Rules of
Order, and time; the
Constitution should comply
with the Handbook of the
Lutheran Church-Missouri
Synod, as shown by Mr. Van
Manen.

Mrs. Arneson moved that page 2, Line 42, under Article III, strike out the words, "Not conflict," and insert "ne in harmony." Seconded by Mrs. Lillian Long. Passed.

Mr. Archie Marshall moved that on Page 2, Line 55, under Article IV, strike out the word "individuals" and insert "active in deaf affairs." A. Arneson seconded. Passed.

Mr. Long moved that on Page 2, Line 6, "active in deaf affairs" be inserted between the words "Lutheran....of," and not to hold office," on Line 61, after "one vote." Seconded by Elise Berg. Passed.

The Resolution Committee was appointed by President Schulz. The names are Mrs.

Rae DeRose, Mr. Uriel Jones and that we tentatively adopt the Rev. W. O. Neisch, Chairman. rest of the Constitution and

Adjourned for lunch.

The meeting was resumed after the lunch by the three songs given by Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere, Mrs. Julie Soncrant, and Mrs. Emma Mappes.

Rev. Charles Jones introduced Mrs. Warneck of Des Plaines, Illinois. She brought greetings from Mrs. Naomi Warth of Brazil. She worked with the deaf children there. President introduced Mr. Robert Lankenau, the President of N.A.D. and gave a short comment.

We started with the revising of ILDA Constitution on Page 3, Line 85. Mrs. DeRose moved that "deaf and shall be." Seconded by Arthur Anderson. Passed. Mr. Warren Riege moved that "the regional officers shall designate his alternate from among themselves" be inserted after Line 117, on Page 3, "at a meeting...," and strike out the words, "he shall...of his region: on lines 117 and 118. Bob Mercer seconded. Passed.

Rev. William Ludwig moved that in the last six (6) remaining pages and because of lack of time during the ILDA session, that we tentatively adopt the rest of the Constitution and request the Board of Directors to study and revise it, and present it to the next ILDA Convention. Passed.

Mr. Warren Riege moved that at the next convention we are to have four (4) days of convention, instead of three (3) days, becaue lack of time and unable to finish our work. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed.

Mr. Donald Mowl moved that the Nominating Committee be formed with Clarence Schulz as chairman with four (4) names now. Seconded by Richard Crossen. The four names are Dale Paden, Warren Riege, R. Crossen and Archie Marshall.

Kansas City, Missouri has volunteered to be the next host for the ILDA Convention in 1973.

Warren Riege moved that the host city be responsible for the preparation of the program for the next convention. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed.

Mr. D. Mowl suggested us to have three (3) colors for the ILDA Banner. Ben Beaver moved that we have the ILDA banner of white and blue color with the red for border. Dale Paden seconded. Passed. This was with an understanding that

the Board of Directors will make the final decision on the colors of the ILDA banner.

President Schulz thanked the committee (Dixie Region) for the arrangement of the displays in the exhibition hall.

Warren Riege moved that each ILDA member p ay one (1) dollar a year to help the ILDA treasury. Harvey Boldt seconded. Passed. Archie Marshall amended that we raise the registration fee from one (1) to two (2) dollars. Passed.

Don Mowl moved that the ILDA is officially organized in the year of 1971 and recorded in the secretary book. D. Grossen seconded. Passed.

Mr. Gary Schlub was introduced as Chairman of Nominations for 1971 before voting for the new officers, Gary Schlub gave us the names of each office to vote on. The convention voted by secret ballot. The new officers will be announced at the banquet tonight.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 PM. Rev. William Lange gave a closing prayer.

The banquet program was started at 7:30 PM with the dinner in the Rosemont Ballroom in Regency Hyatt House. The Master of Ceremonies was Rev. Herbert Rohe, Secretary for Ministry to the Deaf, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

With the recognition of protem officers of ILDA, Rev. H. Rohe announced Mr. Marion Van Manen as new President, Mr. Uriel Jones as President-Elect, Robert Baker as Secretary, of an organizing convention and Gary Schlub as Treasurer.

The banquet speaker, Robert O. Lankenau, President of the National Association of the Deaf, urged ILDA to take an active part in the future of the deaf world and to be active in behalf of the welfare of the deaf.

The musical painting was demonstrated by Mr. John Morsman, of Elgin, Illinois. Each guest received a serigraph print copy of this painting at the end of the banquet.

Rev. William Ludwig gave the opening prayer. President Clarence Schultz opened a short detailed planning, to the meeting on Sunday Morning, July 18, 1971 at United Room (?), Regency Hyatt House, Chicago. He announced the next convention will be at Kansas City, Missouri in 1973.

Rev. Herbert Rohe gave a comment about the Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf (C.O.S.D.) and he thanked to Rev. Charles Jones and the Chicago host committees, laymen and officers for successful convention.

President Schulz wanted the Resolution Committee to give the resolution before church service:

Whereas, the smooth progress requires the cooperation of many persons functioning in a variety of capavities, and

Whereas, the blessings of God have attended plans and sessions of ILDA's first convention, for which we give Him praise and thanks with joy:

THEREFORE be it resolved to thank also all persons who helped make this first convention of ILDA a success, namely Dr. J. A. Preus and Dr. William Kohn for taking time in their busy schedule of church work to be with us here, to the **Convention Committee for** temporary officers who served us well, to the members of the Constitution Committee who spent hours writing and rewriting the ILDA constitution, other contributors as listed on page 16=5 of your convention booklet and to the staff of

Regency Hyatt House who made our stay a pleasant one.

WHEREAS, the first convention of ILDA has been a wonderful experience for the many person registered:

THEREFORE, be it resolved that we accept the generous invitation to Kansas City, extended by Pastor Al Ferber and the deaf of that area, for the 2nd ILDA convention in that city in 1973.

The Convention Festival Rally service with the installation of new officers was held at Rosemont Ballroom at 10:30 AM. It began with the banner processional from each congregation.

Our guest pastor was Dr. J.A.O. Preus, President of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. His sermon was based on Philippians 3:14.

Rev. William Ludwig was the liturgist, Rev. Rodney Rynearson was the interpreter, Mr. John Riddlebaugh was the Lay Leader, Mrs. Evelyn DeMeyere was the choir director, choir to the Regional committees, and was given by Great Lakes region members, and the installing official was Rev. Herbert Rohe.

# ILDA 1995 Convention Minutes (ILDA 25th Anniversary)

#### Thursday, June 29

After an evening filled with registration, opening worship, skits, chorus competition and banner competition a delicious reception was given out.

#### Friday, June 30

The meeting was called to order by President Madding.

Opening prayer was led by Rev. Bergstresser.

Don Mowl gave the report (Necrology), listing all of the ILDA members, also the members of the Board of Directors who have passed away. Pastor names were also listed. Rev. Bergstresser gave the prayer for those in Remembrance.

President Madding introduced officers of committee who will do their duties during the business sessions this weekend. also the interpreters were introduced. President Madding introduced the Resolution Committee Ken Derby.

Minutes of the last Convention was moved and accepted.

Pastor Advisor Rev. Bergstresser gave his report.

Nominating Chairman Lester Ahls announced the nominations for 1995 to 1997. they are as follows:

President-Elect: James-Swalley, and Dennis Konkel. Secretary: Alice Hagemeyer and James Swalley.

Treasurer: Susan Konkel and Ken Norton. Pastor Advisor, Don Leber, John Reinke and George Natonick. Meeting adjourned at 8:30 A.M. for the tour.

#### Saturday, July 1

Pastor Jerold Munz led the opening Devotion at 8:07 A.M.

Business session called to order at 8:25 A.M.

Lester Ahls, Chairman of Nominating took the floor. There was a problem that came up two candidates have asked to have their names removed from the nomination. It was asked the constitution be suspended and it was moved and carried.

Dr. Rynearson gave his Synodical report.

Treasurer report was given by Dennis Konkel. First, he gave the 1993 to 1995 financial report and then he gave his report on the four separate accounts we now have. It was moved and carried.

Nominating Committee Chairman Lester Ahls took the floor for the election. Each candidates gave their background before vote was taken place.

Law Committee Chairman Larry Gorton gave his report. He introduced the changes the term of President and President-Elect. The term for Pres.-Elect will be one term (Two Years).

Carol Seeger gave her 1993 ILDA convention report.

Treasurer Dennis Konkel gave his report and introduced the 1995-1997 Budget. It was moved and accepted.

Roger Demeyer, Executive Director of Lutheran Schools gave his report regarding the Detroit Lutheran schools for the Deaf and also other Lutheran schools across the country.

1995 ILDA Convention Carol Pickell announced that there were 410 registrations, 180 boat trip, 97 1000 luncheon and 359 banquet.

ILDA Jr. Chairperson Erika Sipchen made her announcement.

Mission Project Chairperson Susan Konkel gave her report and the goal was over, reaching \$25,843.99. Also gave 1995-1997 ILDA Mission Project upped to 31,000.00. It was moved and accepted for the 1995-1997 Mission Project proposal.

Bids for the 1997 convention, St. Louis will be the host for the next convention in 1997. Bid for 1999 convention will be held in Cleveland, Ohio by Pamela Kane and it was approved to accept. Carried.

#### 9. Minutes of the previous convention

<u>Carol Seeger (David Brown) moved to accept the minutes of the 2019 ILDA Topeka, Kansas convention</u> (July 19, 2019) as written. Passed.

#### 10. Treasurer's Report (David G. Brown)

A one page report is inserted into the registration folder. Membership dues letters were mailed out for 2020 -2022 last year. Current membership is 116. \$3,460.71 were collected from the dues. Checking account balance on 7/1/2019 is \$16,878.81. Ending balance on 6/30/2021 is \$24,754.88. Deposits: \$41,952.74 and expenses: \$34,076.67. Savings account balance on 7/1/2019 is \$150,009.21. Ending balance on 6/30/2021 is \$142,800.99. Mission projects donations is \$12,223.83. As of July 1, 2021 there is \$3,223.83 left to pay out to WLDO. Pittsburgh Lutheran Deaf Ministry forfeited their \$1,000 due to COVID reasons. ELCG Deaf Mission Ghana was paid \$1,000. Deaf Youth Ministry of Texas was paid \$5,000 but the balance of \$5,000 was forfeited. David Bush was paid \$2,000. Ryan McDermott (Togo) forfeited \$2,000 because he is no longer serving Togo. WLDO (Reinke) has not been paid prior to the 2021 Chicago convention. The ILDA Board voted to give \$5,000 to WLDO during its Board meeting on July 22, 2021. Auditors of the treasurer's report are Ron Grapatin and Rev. Edwin Bergstresser. The auditors will audit after the convention.

Joy Rader (Cynthia Smith-Byer) moved to accept the Treasurer's report. Passed.

#### 11. President's Report (John Mason)

- President Mason welcomed everyone to the 26th Biennial convention.
- He thanked Prince of Peace Lutheran Church for the Deaf, Spring Lake Park, MN, and the chair, Janet Gehlbach, for hosting the convention in Chicago.
- He encouraged everyone to show up for the workshop presentations.
- He also wanted everyone to go home safely after the convention.

#### 12. Pastoral Advisor's Report (Rev. Tyler Walworth)

Now that the year of COVID fear has gone by, we look back with much important reflection. Many abandoned church. Many stayed home in fear. Many did not fill their vocations of mother, father, son, daughter, friend or worker. As we look back, we have a great reason for repentance. We should have run to the Lord of life located in the office of the ministry and offered to us in His church, instead of run away from him. We should only fear the Lord. We should always go about our vocations as the very commands and desires of God. Therefore, let us bring our petitions of sorrow over our sins to the Lord. Then, we should cling to the good news that Christ never abandoned us. He pursued and pursues us still when we ignore him and he perfectly pays attention to the word of His Father. Jesus only fears His Father and trusts Him completely. Jesus always fills His vocation of Savior, even when He must die on the cross. This is the great and shining light in the midst of the gloom of the last year. We have Christ among us still who forgives our sins by taking them upon himself and receiving their full punishment. #### 13. Synodical Representative Report (Rev. Ron Friedrich, Lutheran Deaf Mission Society Executive Director)

- COVID has forced us to learn new technologies.
- Several pastors have retired (Rev. Steve Schlund, Rev. Richard Moody, and Rev. Gary Lawson).
- Concordia Seminary in St. Louis has DIT and EIIT (Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology) training and SMP (Specific Ministry Pastor) training program. The EIIT program is used by other countries and perfect for the deaf because it works and has online studies.

- World missions has been hit hard all over the world due to COVID, especially Kenya and India.
- Technology—the website deafjesus.org has a directory printed there of congregation worship sites and online worship sites and a resource list.

#### 14. The Deaf Lutheran publication report

- A. Editor (Janet Gehlbach): Janet explained that when she was researching printing costs related to the 2021 convention she was given a discount card from Office Depot. This greatly reduced the cost of printing the convention book and will do the same for the history book. Also, she compared prices for printing the Deaf Lutheran newsletter and found it is way cheaper to use the discount card. She discussed this with Carolyn Snyder-Mason, Deaf Lutheran Business Manager, and we both agreed to switch printing companies.
- B. Business Manager (Carolyn Snyder-Mason): Carolyn explained she takes care of the money related to printing and postage costs of the Deaf Lutheran newsletter. There are about 50 paid subscribers.

Three (3) people were appointed for the Law Committee (John Mason, Rev. Ron Friedrich and Gregory Werth) to discuss future ILDA conventions. It was proposed to do a one time delay of one year to 2024. ILDA conventions conflict with Deaf Seniors of America and Lutheran Women's Missionary League conventions during the same odd-numbered year. People would tend to go to those conventions rather than coming to the ILDA convention. This proposed change hopefully will improve attendance at ILDA conventions. The proposed change to the Constitution was published twice in the Deaf Lutheran newsletter. The Constitution requires a two-thirds vote to approve. If approved the next ILDA convention will be in 2024.

#### 18. Voting on proposed changes

Carolyn Snyder-Mason (Tim Kearney) moved to accept the proposed Constitution change that "ILDA shall hold conventions every two (2) years in **even**-numbered years. Regional branches are encouraged to meet in **odd**-numbered years. The conduct as well as all plans, conditions and provisions shall be set forth in this Constitution and its Handbook. All of the ILDA conventions shall be self-supporting. And be it finally RESOLVED that this change in the ILDA convention schedule begin three (3) years following the ratification of this amendment." Passed.

#### 19. Introduction of Mission Projects (Carolyn Snyder-Mason)

A. Carolyn received the following requests and they are listed in order received:

- Youth Ministry of Texas \$7,000
- Kenya \$1,000
- India \$4,931 The ILDA Board approved increasing this amount to \$6,000

#### 20. Other Committee's Report

Previous convention committee chairperson: 2019 Topeka, KS, convention report by Sara Hale

- KansaSEED hosted the convention at the Capital Plaza Hotel. It was a joint conference with the Interpreted Ministry Conference (IMC).
- There were 53 registered ILDA attendees and 18 registered IMC attendees.

- Fundraising was done by doing butter braid sales, dinners, silent auction, garage sale. Letters were mailed to various churches asking for donations.
- ILDA/IMC was a lot of fun and received positive feedback. Service events were well received and ten tied
  warm blankets were donated to Silverback KS and the food harvester benefited from our making mesh
  fruit bags.
- Convention opened on Thursday evening with an ice breaker, banner display, song contest and refreshments. Friday was ILDA Business Meeting and IMC workshops and some free time. Saturday was joint workshops, service project and banquet with keynote speaker, Rev. Bill Wrede giving a presentation on his experience with the World Trade Center collapse. Sunday concluded with communion/worship.


