We hope that you have received your Summer issue of *The Deaf Lutheran* in good shape last July. In that issue were flyers and registration forms for ILDA's Cleveland '99 Convention. Please understand that those flyers and forms were printed by the Cleveland '99 Committee and inserted into *The Deaf Lutheran*. And also the committee gave *The Deaf Lutheran* \$100 for postage.

Your *Deaf Lutheran* editor and business manager want to keep your newsletter in good financial and selfsupporting shape. Paper, printing and postage has become very expensive over the years. After reviewing our expenses for the six month period, we had to raise the subscription price by **only** \$1.00 to keep the newsletter in production.

For this Fall Issue, we are experimenting with 12 pages instead of our normal 8-page newsletter. The reason is that we wanted to see if the postage will truly stay the same. William Ludwig celebrate his retirement from the deaf ministry with a celebration church service and Lord's Supper, followed by a reception lunch and program. Rev. Ludwig gave a very inspiring message, "My Farewell Prayer," based from the Book of Philipians in which Paul before he left his people, prayed for God's blessing with the assurance that God continues to abide with them as they continue sharing their love and faith with each other while doing God's work.

Rev. Ludwig had been serving the past year as vacancy pastor at Western

Washington Lutheran Church of the Deaf, serving in Seattle as well as the surrounding cities of Tacoma, Everett, Bremerton and small town of Yakima at the other side of the Cascade Mountains. The Northwest District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod blessed the continuing deaf ministry with a gift in a new pastor, Roger Blesi, who by now has started his new ministry.







Rev. Ludwig faithfully served as Pastor to the Deaf for a long and blessed thirty-nine years. He had served the past twenty-seven years at Western Washington Lutheran Church of the Deaf. Previously, he served at Holy Cross Lutheran Church of the Deaf in Columbus, Ohio. He took undergraduate studies at Gallaudet College in Washington, DC before he was the first Deaf person to study and graduate with a Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1959 from Concordia Seminary in Springfield, Illinois. He received a Master of Divinity degree in 1970 from the same seminary. As a wonderful deaf model, he helped open a new avenue for many other Deaf who came and followed him as trained pastors. He was one of the numerous leaders who developed the constitution in 1971 that enabled the Deaf Lutherans to have their own fellowship known as the International Lutheran Deaf Association, of which he continues to zealously participate and support.

He and his wonderful wife, Sigrid are planning to spend a lot of time with their three grown children and five grandchildren who all live near their Seattle home. They plan to travel around the country in the near future.

May God continue to bless Rev. Ludwig, his growing and loving family and those who know and love him.

U.S. shuts W. Africa missions over threats

ACCRA (Reuters) - The United States shut its embassies and other government facilities in the West African states of Ghana and Togo on Monday following "increased threats," a U.S. statement and embassy officials said. A statement issued by the U.S. embassy in Ghana's capital Accra said threats to U.S. facilities, which it did not spell out, had been received both there and in neighboring Togo. Embassy officials said the closure was temporary and the statement said emergency cases would be handled. This year the **Ephphatha Conference** in Ft. LCMS 60th Regular Convention in St. Louis on July 11-17, 1998...

I (Larry Ginter) was the Ohio District Delegate with 40 Pastors and other delegates to the LCMS Convention.

I arrived in St. Louis with the Ohio District-LCMS group on Saturday morning. We went to the American's Convention Center. It is very big, room as like the shopping mall!. I saw many pastors and delegates there. The Lutheran's convention theme was "To the Ends of the Earth." On Saturday evening, we had Holy Communion worship service at American's Center. Mill Neck Foundation Honors a Servant Leader

About 200 people attended a special event at the Missouri Athletic Club in downtown St. Louis during the week of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's synodical convention.

At a July 12th evening banquet, chaired by Rev. Thomas Armour, President of the Mill Neck Foundation, the John of Beverley Medal was presented to Rev. Louis R. Jasper. D.D. Ed.D. Dr. Jasper was selected as this year's recipient by the Mill Neck Foundation Board of Directors for his lifelong commitment to service among God's people who are Deaf.

By his side and sharing in the honor, was Joan, his wife of over forty years. Guests included leaders and executives within the church body, Mill Neck Foundation supporters, pastoral delegates from districts near the Mill Neck campus and Mill Neck Foundation and school staff.

For over 40 years, Dr. Jasper has worked in this country and abroad as a missionary to the Deaf, parish pastor, school chaplain, teacher, professor and consultant.

Memories of his past work include his involvement at Mill Neck Manor back in the late 50's, both as chaplain and as a contributor to the ,John of Beverley workbook series.

His pioneering efforts since 1967 in the Far East have helped and continue to bring the Good News to Deaf people in Hong Kong and Macau.

"Vision, energy, commitment and, above all, a reliance on and acknowledgment that our efforts are possible solely because of God's Grace. These are hallmarks of Dr. Jasper's life," said Dr. Mark R. Prowatkze, Executive Director of the Mill Neck Family, during his welcoming remarks.

Although retired and settled in the Village of Newark, New York, Dr. Jasper's ministry work continues in Macau. Rev. Thomas Dunseth and Jennifer Knaack, both at the dinner, honored Rev. Jasper and spoke of their commitment to continue his mission.

"It has taken four people to fill his shoes They don't make missionaries like that anymore. Dr. Jasper taught us how the Lord uses us." said Dunseth.

Dunseth and his family arrived in Macau in January of 1994. "The first faces we saw when we arrived were Louis and Joan Jasper's They took care of us as if we were family during the following months. They helped our transition into a new land and culture go smoothly and happily," he remembers.

According to Dunseth, he was not called to Macau to work with the Deaf at all. "I was called to be a church planter among the Cantonese speaking population and help out at the already established Lutheran congregation. But when the Jasper's retired and returned to America, there was no one to continue the spiritual leadership that Dr. Jasper had started and so diligently carried on for years at Concordia School," he said.

The mission board wanted Dr. Jasper's work to continue Seeing the need, Dunseth took on the task, without education, experience or the language. "Because of the encouragement of many, including Louis Jasper, and our dear Lord himself, I have started to acquire the skills this year," he said.

Working under Rev. Dunseth's supervision at Concordia School of Special Education in Macau, will be 22 year-old Jennifer Knaack, the first Deaf Missionary for the LCMS.

"I am very excited to go to Macau. I want to help all of them know Jesus. I know I will have a lot of work. I hope you will keep me in your prayers," she said during the banquet.

Mill Neck Foundation is granting one-third of the money for her expenses. She left for Macau in August and will remain there for one year. Mr. Eberlein, founding member of the Lutheran Friends of the Deaf, and Treasurer of the Mill Neck Family, read the medal citation honoring Dr. Jasper.

During his acceptance, Dr. Jasper said, "I was just doing my duty to my Lord, responding to his love. God continues to bless the work of others. I have merely built on what they started. I pray the Lord will continue to do that. Thank you for coming to be here this evening and to share this event."

Created late in 1958 by the internationally renowned sculptor-artist, Donald DeLue, the John of Beverley Medal is awarded once every three years to recognize accomplishments that directly affect and positively improve the lives of Deaf people.

Rolling up their sleeves, the Mill Neck Manor students joined hearing youth to help tie down a trailer house. They cleaned out Bud's wind break and replanted trees.

"We worked from about 7 AM to 5 PM and I really enjoyed it," said Joseph Malone. Their mission was to help, and the students reaped the self-satisfaction of hard work. Little did they know, Bud would share some gifts of his own.

"He was the best person for our students first servanthood experience," said Barbara Lanman, Mill Neck Foundation's Coordinator of Deaf Ministry who planned the trip. "He had the patience and ability to communicate visually. Bud, a sheep rancher who trains Border Collies, showed the students every step of what to do. He showed them how to train dogs and ride a tractor. He even made sure each student had an opportunity to ride his mule, Lorraine.

"We went away with more than what he got," felt Susan Dunne. "We couldn't have asked for anyone more giving of himself," she said.

Joseph Malone remembers the delicious waffles Bud cooked for lunch.

"The experience was such a sharing of gifts," said Lanman. "Our students grew from being unsure to feeling proud of themselves," she said. "It was great to see the change in such a short time. They were pleased to give to him."

"It made me very happy to work and help out," said Victor Urich, who hopes to he able to do it again in another State. According to Lanman, plans are already in the works for students to help out in Canada next year at Pax Natura Ranch, a Deaf Youth Horse Ranch. "We grow in ourselves and feel better about ourselves when we give to others," says Lanman. This philosophy is what spurred her and High School Principal Dennis Tobin to organize special service projects for the students at Mill Neck Manor.

"Quite often our students are on the receiving end, and now we have a way for them to give back. Helping in other states also exposes them to human needs that occur in other places," said Tobin. The trip to South Dakota was funded by Mill Neck Foundation through a grant for youth outreach ministry.
