

Ordination and Installation of Rev. David S. Neilsen as Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church of the Deaf, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada

Rev. David Nielsen and his wife Jean, daughters Marisa and Erika, and son Thomas arrived in British Columbia on February 4, 1999. The following week the moving van brought their goods across the border and to the house the congregation had rented for them in Surrey, BC.

On Sunday, February 21, 1999 Rev. David Nielsen was ordained and installed as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Vancouver, BC. Participating in the service were 18 pastors and over 100 lay people. The deaf churches and community were represented by Pastors Roger Blesi and William Ludwig of Seattle, and Rev. Wayne Bottlinger, Pastor Emeritus in Vancouver. Pastors from the Vancouver area represented the English, Hispanic, Chinese Mandarin and Cantonese, and Korean ministries. Lay people, both deaf and hearing, from the various ethnic backgrounds were present. Four deaf-blind members were in attendance.

Rev. Harold Ruf, president of the Alberta-British Columbia District, delivered the sermon. The choirs of Trinity Lutheran Church for the Deaf and Prince of Peace Lutheran (Chinese) signed and sing the hymn selections. The ladies of Trinity Lutheran-Deaf hosted a reception for Pastor Nielsen and his family after the service. What a glorious day it was for Trinity-Deaf in Vancouver!

Interesting Facts About Deaf Did You Know...?

There are approximately 22 million hearingimparied persons in the U.S. Deaf people have safer driving records than hearing people nationally.

The huddle formation used by football teams orginated at Gallaudet University, a liberal arts college for deaf people in Washington, D.C., to prevent other schools from reading their sign language.

The man who invented shorthand, John Gregg, was deaf.

Carl Anderson, a deaf cartoonist, is the creator of "Henry".

A deaf center-fielder for the Cincinnati Reds, William Hoy, invented the hand signals for strikes and balls in baseball.

Phyllis Frelich won the Tony Award for Best Actress of 1980 in the Broadway play "Children of a Lessor God". Ms. Frelich is profoundly deaf.

Two of the Osmond brothers and Nanette Fabray all have hearing impairments. When Beethoven created his ninth symphony, he was profoundly deaf.

Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, was originally an instructor for deaf children and invented the telephone to help his deaf wife and mother to hear.

Scuba drivers often use sign language under water. Deaf people can sign/talk at great distances without the use of amplificiation through the use of sign language.

Deaf people have created a language known as American Sign Language which has been linguistically defined as a separate language such as English, French, and German.



Since the 1890's the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod has sent missionaries to teach the students at the only state residential school for deaf children in Illinois, (I.S.D.) Since the mid 1970's Synod placed deaf missions and ministries under their respective districts. (Sometimes a field overlaps district. For example, we serve the students for the Northern and Southern Illinois Districts, LC-MS.) We are the Lutheran ministry to deaf children from East St. Louis, Chicago, Carondale, East Moline, and all Illinois children of various races, and backgrounds. We have also been asked to serve deaf college students near East St. Louis. Christ Lutheran Church of the Deaf (Jacksonville, Illinois) is subsidized by our Central Illinois Lutheran congregations, and is deliberately located across the street from the state school to be our district's mission base to the deaf students. Bringing you Good News from Macau!

April, 1999

Hark the voice of Jesus calling, "Who will go and work today?

Fields are white and harvests waiting, Who will bear the sheaves away?"

Greetings!

Amazing...I've already been here in Macau for seven months. It's very warm here-in the mid 70's. Flowers are blooming on the trees and people are starting to wear shorts again. Don't you Northerners wish that you were here? Easter is here and we can celebrate Jesus' resurrection!

What I've been doing:

I do much work with Rev. Thomas Dunseth at the Concordia School of Special Education and do outreach to the local deaf community. Here's what I do- religion classes at school, morning prayers and devotions, choir practice (doing the Easter play), deaf association and deaf bowling (so I can get to know the local deaf community and learn more signs), girls' group, student fellowship, and deaf adult Bible study.

The Deaf Bible study started last January and is on Sunday afternoons. We've had a good turn out, despite the differences in the deaf community. There's a division between groups just like in America. We plan to start a deaf worship on Easter Sunday with an interpreted service with the local Chinese community. This is a very exciting thing as the Deaf have not had an opportunity to worship together for a long time.

We are all doing mission work. Some of us need to plant, fertilize, water, or tend the harvest. "Maybe not bring in the crop, but we need to be out in the fields sowing the seed. The Holy Spirit will see to the rest." Many souls are out there ready to hear about Jesus and His love! You sent me here with your support, I am now here doing the work. And I must tell you I love it.

Concordia School of Special Education:

Last December, I noticed that the school didn't even have a nativity. I thought a good Christmas gift from all of you who supported me would be a new nativity. So, I bought a beautiful nativity set and presented it on the behalf of the Lutheran Deaf churches. They were very thankful.

I feel that it's very important to work in the school because it's the time when we can teach the students with prayer and religion classes. Once they graduate, they are out in the world. It's harder to find them and they are lost easily. Deaf teens at the school need a safe haven, to know that they have a Lord who loves and protects them. They need to see that they don't have to give into the bad influences and that they can take a stand for their faith.

The Deaf in Macau:

Family- I could observe that Diana (a good friend of mine - has helped me out so much) had the same basic frustrations as many other deaf people with not being able to communicate with her family. Her family knows very little sign language and Diana is often left out. In China, it is a "shame" to have a deaf child. They are hidden in their homes and some don't start school until very late. There is very little education about the Deaf as compared to other countries.

Education- The education is very behind here. Students who go to Concordia school can graduate from Form 5 (12th grade). However, some decide to leave after Form 3 (10th grade). Those students don't realize the opportunity they have! This makes finding a job very difficult. They cannot get upscale jobs with good pay. One student just left school because she didn't feel like studying because she thought she could make more money. It really doesn't make any difference if she

stays until Form 5, because then she'd make the same amount of money. Also, Diana is the first and only deaf student at the University of Macau, but has no interpreters.

Equipment/ accommodations- The deaf have fax machines, not TTY's. There are no closed captions for TVs or movies, but they are open captioned in Chinese. It doesn't help me out much since I don't read Chinese! Many don't have deaf alarmsthey depend on their own natural body clocks to wake up in the morning. Trust me, it does work for them. Few of them have flashing lights for doorbells, crying babies, and the phone. There is no local interpreting service- no interpreters are provided for any kind of need- doctor, job interview, or meetings. The deaf are not allowed to drive. Only hard-of-hearing persons can get a driver's license!

My plans:

I have made a decision to stay longer. I want to stay until just before Christmas in December. I have made much progress on learning the sign language and am more settled down. There is so much left to be done and adding a few more months wouldn't hurt.

I might be coming back to America this June. I want to attend the ILDA (International Lutheran Deaf Association) meeting in Ohio, as well as the Ephphatha Conference (for pastors to the Deaf) for a few days. I want to make several presentations and raise more support. I also want to look for new volunteers.

Do you want to help out?

Come to Macau as a volunteer! You've read all those wonderful things happening in Macau as a result of God's work. We desperately need two people to volunteer to come to Macau and continue the work. Is God leading you to serve? Do you know anyone who wants to serve?

We need to train certain deaf leaders to take up the leadership for an indefinite term. One such example is Diana, who has been baptized and will be confirmed this Easter! She is already doing so much with the Concordia students and is a blessing to the mission work here.

I also need more financial support if I am to stay longer. Please continue to send your support, both prayers and financially. There is always a need for more and it is a wonderful way for you to be involved in mission work.

Praise the Lord for:

- The deaf adult Bible study- Diana being confirmed- The Concordia students on a wonderful Easter performance

Please include in your prayers:

- Starting deaf worship services- More opportunities to meet new deaf people- Motivate Concordia students with a desire to learn more- My planning to return home this June for a month.
