Greetings in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ the only true Savior and Friend of sinners! I am surprised that a wonderful time of celebration is about to be here already! Why, of course, I am talking about Christmas.

The question is this: do we celebrate Christmas as a commercial holiday or a Christian? Still better' do we try to combine both holidays into one so that we can see it as a good old "American" holiday. I believe very strongly that how we sign the word "Christmas" can show very clearly how we celebrate it. We all know that there are different signs used to sign "Christmas." I personally know of five different signs. Maybe you may know that there are more than five of them. In order to understand which sign is more appropriate for us when it comes to Christmas, we should go back to learn on how Christmas itself began.

According to history, the Church in Rome celebrated Christmas, known as the Feast of the Nativity, for the first time as early as 336 AD. The word "Christmas" became part of the English language around 1050 AD as the old English phrase: *Christes Maessee*, meaning "festival of Christ." The shortened version of Christmas as *Xmas* came into use in the 13th century. The *X* stands for the Greek letter *chi*, an abbreviation of *khristos* (Christ), and also represents the cross on which Jesus was crucified.

Although the Gospels of Matthew and Luke give detailed descriptions of the birth of Jesus, they gave no specific dates of His birth. As a result, the Church in Rome chose December 25th as the day for the festival of the Nativity so as to give Christian meaning to existing pagan celebrations. For example, the Church replaced festivities honoring the birth of the Mithra (ancient Persian god of light) with festivities honoring the birth of Jesus, whom the Bible calls the Light of the world.

We Lutheran Christians know very well that Jesus came into the world as a Babe so that He can save sinners from the world sin, the reign of Satan and the eternal death in hell. Actually, Almighty God created man to live forever, but sin came into our life because of disobedience. So, Christ Jesus came here on this earth to be born in order to die. That is why we celebrate the birth of our Savior. So it is pretty easy to decide on which sign that can be appropriate for the festival of the Nativity. The sign is thus: Christ-Birth-Celebrate. I fully realize that it is difficult to change our usual "pagan" signs of Christmas to the more appropriate Christian sign. With the help of the Holy Spirit, our Comforter from our Heavenly Father and our Savior, it can be done' After all, Jesus Himself says that we can do all things through His strength.

Come, brothers and sisters in Christ, let us be bold to always sign to our friends and family members as well as all other people at work or at play:

Meanwhile, your Deaf Lutheran Editor and Business Manager have been preparing *The Deaf Lutheran* and ILDA for the new millennium.

I had a very extremely busy year this year. It has been a very demanding three-year project for me with the Cleveland '99 ILDA Convention like meetings and doing all the graphic stuffs – fliers, forms, and the program book.

This fall also has been very busy time for me. After receiving Mill Neck Foundation's check, orders were made through the web sites (www.MacMall.com and www.apple.com) and shipments were received, unpacked and checked. A couple of months were spent setting up and preparing the Macintosh to our Deaf Lutheran specifications. As usual with new equipment and software, computer bugs pop up. It has been a long, painful job and about every evenings and weekend were spent getting the equipment ready. Keep in mind that I have over ten years of Macintosh experience, at work and at home.

This Christmas issue of *The Deaf Lutheran* is the first issue produced on the new equipment. The page layout is now produced with Adobe PageMaker 6.5 Plus software. The mailing database has been changed to Microsoft Excel 98 software and printed on smaller label to save cost of the label sheets. Instead of 20 addresses per sheet, we now print 30 addresses per sheet. The three former address files are now combined and printed in zip code order on label for easier sorting.

Now after being your editor for a little over two years, I am now more experienced with ILDA procedures and events. I have received many good comments about the Cleveland '99 convention coverage (photos) in the last issue. I apologize to the St. Louis '97 committee for not publishing much of their convention, as I was new to ILDA back then. More coverage improvements will be made for future conventions.

Another new millennium project I am working on is ILDA's new brochure. Hopeful printing and distribution date is January 2000. ILDA's millennium goal should be to increase membership and spread the gospel. Starting in January is a good time to start making a list and suggestions to the Board and to ILDA's Mission Project chairperson where our 2001-2005 Mission Project goal should go.

Federal regulators warn Americans of phone billing scams

A recent article in the Cleveland Plain Dealer has attracted my attention. I don't know of any ILDA members in the Caribbean so for you mainland ILDA members, here is what the article is about.

Be alert to the 809 area code. One common variation of the scam is for a person to receive an e-mail message saying something like: "Thank you for your order. This is to confirm \$375 is being charged to your Visa card. If you believe this charge to be in error, please call..."

At that point, the message directs callers to a number **without specifying** that it's in a Caribbean area code.

People who immediately call the number to avoid an improper charge to their credit card have fallen into the trap and may find a charge of \$25 or more on their next phone bill.

An e-mail isn't the only way victims are hooked. An even simpler method scammer use is to leave a "please return call" message on a person's pager.

The fraud involves duping people into making long-distance calls to offshore phones, generating high per-minute charges. **So watch out for any phone number that have an 809 area code in it.**



- Lutheran Church Missouri Synod(LCMS) convention in Fort Wayne in 1896.
- Meeting site of the founders of the ILDA in Chicago in 1971.
- Marion Van Manen as the first ILDA president in 1971.

If there is a chance that you know of someone who may know a source of the above illustrations or have such pictures yourself, please let me know through David Brown, your editor. If they are used, either in the videotape or in the DEAF LUTHERAN, you will receive credit.

ILDA Trivia: Why did Edward Pahl want deaf church services in Chicago?

Answer: Many deaf people like him worked in the Chicago area. He felt that people who have learned the word of God from Lutheran School should continue with their bible study. Rev. Augustus Reinke in Chicago was willing to learn American Sign Language from Edward Pahl. On March 4, 1894, Rev. Reinke began to preach using sign language to 13 deaf people at his church.

For the sixth consecutive year, children from Mill Neck Manor School for the Deaf participated in a Camp for Deaf children ages 8 through 12, at Camp Ma-He-Tu in Bear Mountain, New York. Barbara Lanman, Coordinator of Deaf Ministry for Mill Neck Foundation, is the organizer of this spiritual camping experience. The counselors and leaders at this camp are Deaf and/or skilled in sign language, which helps to make this camp an even more rewarding experience for the Deaf campers.

During the week, the campers enjoyed a variety of activities and craft projects. The activities included kayaking, making homemade ice cream, tye-dye t-shirts, archery and enjoying bon fires. There was a prayer before each meal. "The focus was on the fact that we are all part of God's family and as family members we learn acceptance and forgiveness of one another. This is especially important as we live together as a "camp family," says Barbara Lanman. Mrs. Auslander, the wife of Mill Neck Manor's Board member, Rudolph Auslander, made a special visit to the camp this year to give the campers a class on constructing origami. The campers made paper hats, boats, birds and flowers.

According to Barbara Lanman, one very important component of the camp program is the idea of giving service back to the camp facility. In appreciation for using the Ma-He-Tu camp facility, the children painted the boat racks that hold the canoes and picked up litter. Last year, they participated in litter pick up and painted a railing around the dining hall. "These "giving back" activities foster positive Christian values which encourage our deaf children to participate in Mill Neck Manor's Servanthood Project when they get older," says Lanman.

Since it's beginning in 1994, this special camp has proven to be an unforgettable experience, filled with lots of good memories for all involved.

If Noah lived in the United States today...

And the Lord spoke to Noah and said, "In one year, I am going to make it rain and cover the whole earth with water until all flesh is destroyed. But I want you to save the righteous people and two of every kind of living thing on the earth. Therefore, I am commanding you to build an Ark." In a flash of lightening, God delivered the specifications for an Ark. In fear and trembling, Noah took the plans and agreed to build the Ark. "Remember" said the Lord, "You must complete the Ark and bring everything aboard in one year."
